



## Beverly Irene Hutchinson

April 14, 1927 - January 4, 2025

Beverly Irene (Broman) Hutchinson was born April 14, 1927. She was the first of three children born to Wesley and Irene Broman of Willmar, Minnesota. She passed peacefully at the age of 97 at N.C. Little Memorial Hospice in Edina after sustaining a fall and a broken leg on December 27th, 2024. Until that morning, Beverly was living independently at Vernon Terrace in Edina, Minnesota.

Beverly grew up in Willmar, Minnesota and had a zest for life and adventure, and practiced a love of learning her entire life. She graduated from high school in 1945.

She was enthusiastic for whatever activities or opportunities passed her way, whether it was playing percussion in the school band, joining the early version of a "Girls Physical Education" group, hitchhiking to the roller-skating rink in Spicer, Minnesota, or joining a guy friend for shooting practice at the local dump. She was always a "gamer"!

Beverly enjoyed the outdoors and especially loved lake activities. She was the only girl who joined a group of guy friends who pooled their money to rent a boat for a day so they could go waterskiing in the 1940s. She was also a lifeguard at Green Lake in Spicer, Minnesota, and that's where (she claims) she first spotted the handsome George Hutchinson from Kandiyohi,

Minnesota. They began dating in high school, but the courtship was interrupted for a time when he enlisted in the army at the age of 18 and spent time on the border of France and Germany in WWII.

After high school, Beverly attended the University of Minnesota with aspirations to become a doctor. She was always a voracious reader, and one of her favorite books as a teenager was the biography "The Doctors Mayo", published in 1941.

George returned from the war and joined her at the U of M for a short time, using the GI Bill. When she ran out of funds, and George found classwork difficult immediately upon discharge from the war, they moved back to Willmar and got married on September 12, 1948.

Back in Willmar, Beverly worked in the Rice Hospital lab to continue working in the medical environment that fascinated her. Hospital protocols were very different in the 1940s. She loved to tell stories of the variety of jobs she was asked to do, like holding someone's legs in the OR, or helping to clean up the OR after a surgery.

Beverly became a full-time mom with the birth of her first daughter Sharon, followed by her second daughter, Debra, (who now goes by "Sonja") then a son, Mark, and finally Susan.

Once they became parents, Beverly and George moved to Atwater, Minnesota, where George's parents lived. He was co-owner of a grocery store in Atwater until he sold his share of the store and pivoted to start nurturing a successful independent insurance agency, which he ran until his death in 1990.

In the town of Atwater, Beverly became active in the school PTA, was a Girl

Scout and Cub Scout leader, a Sunday School teacher and children's choir director at the Atwater Methodist Church, and also was the unofficial "first-call-for-advice" EMT when folks got scrapes and bruises or had medical questions not requiring an immediate trip to the hospital.

Once Beverly's children were in school, she became a co-director of a new type of center and day school for special needs children. Until 1961, parents of special needs children who couldn't attend regular schools had to choose between taking care of them at home or sending them to a state institution. Rural areas had the fewest resources for these children. In 1961, the state of Minnesota allocated funds to open what were called "Day Activity Centers" (DACs) to help fill the gap in care for these children. The Kandiyohi/Meeker County DAC opened in Atwater in 1962.

The thinking for having specialized education to help children realize their fullest potential was a newer concept at the time. There were no special trainings or college degrees for this type of teaching. Beverly learned of a new type multisensory teaching technique called the "Montessori Method" that she thought might be useful in her work with babies and children, so she took it upon herself to attend some Montessori trainings in the Twin Cities in the 1970s and incorporated those techniques in her work. At that time, all "special needs" children were put together, so she worked with children with a wide variety of conditions, including Downs Syndrome, cerebral palsy, etc.

Throughout the family years, Beverly and George continued to enjoy Minnesota lake experiences and boating. The family often made summertime visits to beaches, enjoyed renting cabins for vacations, and of course every child was required to take swimming lessons. (Which Beverly had already started with each child while they were still in diapers!)

In 1974, Beverly and George built a house in Kandiyohi, and they lived there until his too-soon death in 1990 - after a short journey with cancer. When he passed away in July, Beverly didn't want that time of year to become a sad memory, so she began hosting her entire family of children - and eventually grandchildren - for summer resort vacations and lake activities (with George's boat) in mid-July. A tradition that eventually continued for 26 consecutive summers.

Beverly moved back to Willmar and kept busy as the president of her condominium building, taking many group travel experiences, and playing in the Bell Choir at the Willmar Methodist Church, which was a great way to express and practice her love of music. During this time, she became a sort of mentor and "adopted" mother to a couple of younger women in her circle of friends. She loved to become friends and be a support to people of all ages and backgrounds. She made friends easily.

At the age of 80, Beverly moved to the senior apartments, Vernon Terrace of Edina, to be closer to her children and grandchildren in the Twin Cities area. While living in Edina, Beverly led various committees in her apartment building and became an active member of the senior community at Christ Presbyterian Church (CPC) in Edina. When she no longer could ride the van to church services, she watched the services every Sunday on her iPad, but never in a robe! She loved the Bible study led at Vernon Terrace by volunteers connected to CPC.

While in the Twin Cities, Beverly continued to share her caregiving skills in a multitude of ways throughout the last 17 years to family and friends, supporting people through cancer journeys, critical surgeries and recoveries, and just being a great listener and a great game-playing friend. Once her legs became weaker, she still treasured walks around the city lakes and through nature areas on sunny days by riding in a wheelchair for longer walks. She

loved being at the same height as children - who often recognized a friendly face and engaged with her. She still loved sitting by a playground to watch the children laugh and play with her observant eyes - noting the various development skills they were exhibiting with their activity.

Beverly was preceded in death by her parents, Wesley and Irene Broman, her brother, Richard Broman, her husband, George Hutchinson, and her eldest daughter, Sharon (Hutchinson) Zoesch.

She is survived by her brother Charles Broman and wife Marcia, daughter Sonja Hutchinson & Rick Rohrer, son Mark Hutchinson and Lori Hutchinson, daughter Susan Bordson and Todd Bordson, plus seven grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

A celebration of life coffee event will be held in the activity room at Vernon Terrace on Thursday, January 9 at 10am for friends and family. A family celebration of life will be held in the Willmar area in July, and interment of ashes will be at Cloverleaf Memorial Park Cemetery.
