I remember her from my youth as always bringing dinner to her parent's home on Sundays. Those same parents happened to be my grandparents and she my Aunt Charlotte from my father's side. Managing Sunday dinner was no small task as she suffered her own physical ailments at a relatively early age. The coldest winter day could not deter her as she made her way over the walkway to the door with a walking cane in one hand while carrying Sunday dinner and the leash attached to her beloved dog Shotsie with the other. As I think about my aunt, whom I didn't know well enough, I wonder today as I did back then, how or why anyone would choose a name like Shotsie for a dog and what, if any, meaning did the name hold?? As it turns out, her maiden name being “Weiser” is of course German and it may be quite a coincidence or entirely none at all that the word Shotsie in German is spelled “Schatzi” which means “little treasure”. So she would come in with Sunday dinner and her “little treasure” like it was the only thing to do and never once did she voice a complaint regarding any personal matter. In fact she is one person that I can honestly say I never heard speak a mean spirited word about anyone. It could have been my youth or some other family dynamic that kept her from voicing any legitimate complaints while I was present those forty or so years ago. Could have been she was just that way. Even in later years I'd run into her from time to time and she would always be thinking of others and what could be of help to them. I knew her well enough to know that seeing and believing in the good side of others was a large part of her own human nature - - for this I consider myself along with others, known and unknown, as lucky and fortunate for having been a witness and beneficiary. I'll always think of her as persevering over adversity and staying true to her inner self and her own inner nature. She was a loyalist, true to the matter of principle and guilty of having the fortitude to make those choices that were unselfishly right for her. She stood directly opposed to the temptation of being a lesser human by refusing to take the easy way out.....unlike most, past

or present, she was in fact courageous in this regard. Thanks Aunt Charlotte for all you've given to me and others as well..... You won't be forgotten for all the good you've done!!! My sincere condolences to all those who will miss her.
