Nichols, Hudson R. Of St. Anthony, passed away peacefully on Saturday, June 6, 2020, at the age of 76. He is survived by Mary, his loving wife of 39 years; his daughter, Ellen of Manhattan, NY; sister, Ferne (George) Covington of Smithfield, Virginia; brother, Joel (Linda) of Tulsa, a large extended family, and countless friends from different walks of life. Hudson's love of the outdoors and the friendships associated with it further expanded with all that Minnesota offered. He was at home at their cabin on Lake Kabetogama in Voyageurs National Park for summer fishing and fall hunting, he was active in the Minnesota Hunting Spaniels Association where he took up dog training and field trialing and made many meaningful friendships both locally and across the country. He was a very skilled photographer and had many friends associated with that field. Hudson was a true friend to many, a kind person to
